MARILLAC MOMS

Marillac Moms provides safe, stable housing and holistic support for single, pregnant women experiencing homelessness with children currently in their care.

What the program provides

- One year of housing in a master-leased apartment
- Life skills and parenting education
- Employment and budgeting support
- Weekly mentoring and case management

Stable housing directly supports healthy pregnancies and long-term family stability. Most participants are expected to achieve self-sufficiency within 15 months.



Ways to Partner with Us

Sponsor an apartment, provide essential household or baby items, or support program operations that help mothers build a stable future.

SUPPORTING TRANSITION TO A BETTER LIVING ENVIRONMENT (STABLE)

Through transitional and rapid rehousing support, STABLE provides personalized guidance and financial assistance to help neighbors move from crisis to a secure and sustainable home.

What the program provides

- Up to 90 days in a motel room
- Rapid Rehousing support: Rental assistance for up to 9 months
- Application fees, security deposit, utility and furniture assistance

By combining housing assistance with employment and financial guidance, STABLE helps families regain independence and avoid future housing crises.



Ways to Partner with Us

Fund transitional and rapid rehousing support; Cover move-in costs like deposits, fees, and utilities; Provide furniture, services, or employee engagement support

INCOME ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM (IAP)

The Income Advancement Program (IAP) is designed to provide comprehensive workforce development support to underemployed individuals in Metro Atlanta, with a focus on enhancing their professional opportunities and achieving sustainable income growth.

What the program provides

The program combines personalized career navigation, direct financial assistance for education and training, and limited support services to help participants transition to gainful employment and achieve long-term self-sufficiency.

About 34% of Georgia households are classified as ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) — meaning they work but do not earn enough to cover basic expenses like housing, food, childcare, and healthcare.



Ways to Partner with Us

Fund training and certifications; Provide hiring pathways and employer connections; Cover job-readiness costs that remove employment barriers; Engage employees through mentorship and skills-based support
